Mon Valley/Fayette Expressway now complete from I-68 to PA Route 51- An August 2 dedication attended by Governor Corbett marked the completion of the 60-mile section of toll road extending from I-68 in West Virginia to PA Route 51 in Allegheny County.

An August 2 dedication of the Brownsville to Uniontown Phase II project attended by Governor Corbett marked the completed of the 60-mile section of toll road extending from I-68 in West Virginia to PA Route 51 in Allegheny County. The dedication, held at the western end of a new bridge across the Monongahela River, marked a major milestone for the Expressway project and the Progress Council's thirty years of advocacy for this major, regional, limited-access highway project. The dedication of the Phase II Brownsville to Uniontown project marked the official opening of the last section of the sixty-mile project from I-68 to PA Route 51.

Commenting on the historic nature of the event Progress Council's executive director Joe Kirk remarked, "I remember Frank Irey's and AI Ferrari's passion and commitment for the Expressway project." Frank Irey was a former president and Ferrari was vice president. Both

are deceased. The \$495 million project dedicated on August 2 included a 3,022-foot bridge across the Monongahela River.

Progress Council president John Easoz noted that the work of the Progress Council is far from complete, " We will continue our commitment to advocate for completion of the Mon Valley/Fayette Expressway and Southern Beltway.

Future funding of both the Expressway and Southern Beltway will be dependent on action on state transportation funding. Recently, Governor Corbett signed into law legislation that will make it far easier to development public/private partnership for major transportation project like the Expressway. Donora, Allenport, Charleroi, and Speers that previously joined the effort to explore and implement cooperative strategies among Mid Mon Valley local governments.

The Cooperative was developed through the Smart Government Initiative funded by a state grant secured by Representative Peter J. Daley.

The final report on a multi-municipal financial review of local governments coordinated by the Cooperative was presented at the July 31 meeting of the Cooperative by PA Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) consultant Michael Weir and Michael S. Foreman, Local Government Services, Southwestern PA office, DCED. Communities that provided detailed local financial information for review included Charleroi, Allenport, Dunleyv, and North Belle Vernon. The evaluation of fiscal conditions compared local fiscal conditions with comparable local governments throughout Pennsylvania. The Financial Monitor Workbook published by the PA Department of Community and Economic Development was used as a basis of the study.

The report also cited the issues that smaller communities seek to be "full service municipalities" but no longer have the tax base and population to support the service.
